Anti-Social Activities Prevention Act, 2007 (Kerala Act 34 of 2007)—Section 3 (1)—Preventive detention—Failure to consider material facts will vitiate order of detention - Mohammed Shanavas P. v. State of Kerala and others - I.L.R. 2026 Kerala OnLine 247: [Neutral Citation No.2026:KER:54247](#).

Constitution of India—Article 22—Delay—The unexplained delay of 51 days in submitting the proposal and 22 days in passing the order snapped the “live and proximate link” between the prejudicial act and preventive detention - Mohammed Shanavas P. v. Constitution of India—Article 22 (5)—Preventive detention—Furnishing illegible copy of material documents relied on to pass order of detention —Such an act will deprive the detenu of an effective opportunity to understand the material relied upon by the Detaining Authority and to make an effective representation against the order of detention as guaranteed under Article 22(5)—Order of detention vitiated on this ground - Mohammed Shanavas P. v. Constitution of India—Article 226—Writ petition is maintainable, wherein there are no factual disputes involved and the question to be decided is a pure question of law,

touching upon the jurisdiction of the District Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission—An employer cannot be treated as a service provider and the employee cannot be treated as a person who availed the services from the employer—Difference between “contract of service” and “contract for service”, pointed out—Employee would not come within the definition of “consumer” as per Section 2(7) of the Consumer Protection Act and the direction to pay gratuity by the Commission was ultra vires—Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 (Central Act 39 of 1972)—Consumer Protection Act, 2019 (Central Act 35 of 2019)—Sections 2(7) and 2(42) - Tirur Service Co-Operative Bank Ltd. No.10094 v. Moideen M.- I.L.R. 2026 Kerala OnLine 246 : [Neutral Citation No.2026:KER:47052](#).

Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 (Central Act 14 of 1947)—Section 2A, 2(s), 17B and 11A—Nature of employment depends upon main and principal duties being performed—Occasional discharge of managerial functions is not sufficient to exclude a person from the definition of workman—There is no need for any evidence in cases where prejudice is implicit— Granting of leave is the prerogative of the employer and it is the duty of the employee to ensure that the leave or extension is sanctioned—Courts must mould reliefs considering the totality of the facts and circumstances—Payment of Subsistence Allowance Act, 1972 (Kerala Act 27 of 1973)—Sections 2(a) and 4 - Shawas Homes Pvt. Limited v. Deputy Labour Commissioner and others - I.L.R. 2026 Kerala OnLine 250 : [Neutral Citation No.2026:KER:41176](#).

Passports Act, 1967 (Central Act 15 of 1967)—Sections 6(2)(f), (g) and 22—G.S.R. No.570(E) dated 25.08.199 permitting issuance of passport to persons accused in criminal cases subject to conditions is not applicable to person against whom a non-bailable warrant is pending—Emergency Certificate permitting to travel to India may be issued to enable such person to travel to India and surrender before the jurisdictional criminal court - Sreejesh P. v. Union of India and others - I.L.R. 2026 Kerala OnLine 245: [Neutral Citation No.2026:KER:46115](#).

Prevention of Money Laundering Act, 2002 (Central Act 15 of 2003)—Section 42—Prevention of Money Laundering Act, 2002, is a complete code by itself—High Court does not have the power to condone the delay of more than 60 days - James George v. Deputy Director - [I.L.R. 2026 Kerala OnLine 249](#).

Service—Compassionate appointment is not a vested or heritable right—The State cannot deny or defer a claim for compassionate appointment by invoking a provision which, on a proper reading of the rules, applies only to a different form of relief—The strict construction required of the claimant is matched, in equal measure, by the requirement that the authority exercise only such power as the rules confer upon it—Purposive construction is a tool to resolve genuine ambiguity; it is not a licence to

override an unambiguous text or to introduce provisions which the legislature/State has not seen fit to introduce – Constitution of India—Article 14—Civil Services (Compassionate Financial Assistance or Appointment) Rules, 2019 (Haryana)—Rules 7 and 23—Interpretation of statutes - Atul Chauhan v.
